WGS 391	Race, Whiteness, and Privilege	This course explores the construction, performance, and uses of whiteness as a racial category. It does so with care and attention whiteness's costs and losses to our collective humanity (Baldwin,1985). Whiteness and its attendant privileges cannot be reduced to skin color. They are a markers of power, prestige, and beauty that can be granted or withheld selectively at will (Painter, 2010). The course is interdisciplinary by design with readings by historians, journalists, essayists, philosophers, and artists. The class centers the voices of scholars who do not identify as white. Topics include: the history of racial categories in the U.S.; people of color's historical observations on whiteness (the literature of white exposure); white privilege; white fragility; 'white talk'; whiteness and ignorance; the inherited 'weight of whiteness' (Bailey, 2021), and recent work on anti-racism (allies/accomplices, and somatic abolitionism).
