## **Required Courses**

### WGS 490: Feminist Theories and Methodological Issues

An interdisciplinary approach to the methods, theories, and conceptual tools feminist scholars use to address social justice issues across a broad range of topics. -or-

#### **ENG 460: Feminist Literary Theories**

Advanced overview of interdisciplinary feminist paradigms emphasizing English studies and literature, theory, and social discourse.

## **Electives**

#### CJS 339: Women in Criminal Justice

Historical and theoretical perspectives and contemporary trends concerning women and crime, and processing of women by the criminal justice system.

#### CJS 342: Victimology

An examination of the victim's role in the criminal event, the process of victimization, patterns, trends, theories and victim offender relationships.

**ENG 360: Studies in Women's Writing** Studies in and theories of women's writing. *May repeat if content differs; maximum of 6 hours.* 

#### **ENG 460: Feminist Literary Theories**

Advanced overview of interdisciplinary feminist paradigms, emphasizing English studies and literature, theory, and social discourse. An option only if not chosen to complete the core requirement of the certificate.

#### HIS 330: The Family in History

History of the family in Europe and America, viewing the changes from idealist, economic determinist, family systems, and psychoanalytic perspectives.

## HIS 350: Women and Sexuality in Ancient Greece and Rome

An exploration of sources, methodologies, and debates concerning women, gender and sexuality in ancient Greece and Rome.

#### POL 337: Gay & Lesbian Politics and Theory

Explores LGBT (lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender) political movements in historical context and with reference to claims for citizenship.

#### **POL 338: Gender and Political Theory**

Examination of how gender shapes and is shaped by public policy formulation and implementation in different political and state contexts.

#### **PSY 305: Psychology of Women**

Psychological research to place in scientific perspective the etiology and behavioral consequences of female and male oriented attitudes.

#### **SOC 341: The Sociology of Gender**

Explores the concepts, theories, and methods sociologists utilize to explain gendered differences in social relations and life changes. Examines individual, interactional, institutional, and social change processes.

#### **SOC 342: Sociology of the Body**

Explores the concepts, theories, and methods sociologists utilize to study the body in social life. Special emphasis on non-normative bodies.

**SOC 366: Contemporary Social Movements** Theories, methods, and research on social movements in the U.S. and on transnational social movements, including women's movements.

# WGS 391: Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies Seminar

A critical examination of selected topics in women's, gender, and sexuality studies. May be repeated if topic is different; maximum of 6 hours.

#### WGS 392: Queer and Transgender Theory

Research in the interdisciplinary field of LGBT/Queer Studies, emphasizing how queer theory informs a variety of academic disciplines and discourses. *Prerequisites: WGS 120 or permission of instructor*.

## WGS 400: Independent Research in Women's & Gender Studies

Research paper or supervised readings on a topic relevant to women's, gender, and sexuality studies. Proposal signed by a faculty advisor and the director or assistant director of Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies required prior to registration. For more information, see "General Courses" in the graduate catalog. May repeat if content differs; maximum of 6 hours.

#### WGS 490: Feminist Theories and Methodological Issues

An interdisciplinary study of methods, theories, analyses, and critiques by feminist scholars to study feminist issues within and across a range of traditional disciplines. An option only if not chosen to complete the core requirement of the certificate.

# WGS 498: Professional Practice: Internship in Women's, Gender, & Sexuality Studies

Supervised work experience in local, state, national, or international businesses, agencies, institutions, or organizations—including teaching internships—focusing on women's and gender issues. May repeat if content differs; maximum of 6 hours. Prerequisites: WGS 490 and consent of director of WGSS.

Check the ISU catalog for any prerequisites.

**Note:** Your plan of study must be arranged with the WGSS Program advisor. With the approval of the director and WGSS advisor, courses with over 50% gender content can be counted toward the certificate.
