ENG 460	Feminist Literary Theories: Apocalyptic Feminisms	Environmental destruction has led to widespread concerns over our survival. Yet pollution, global warming, and erratic weather patterns have had the most adverse and apocalyptic effects on poor people, women, communities of color, Indigenous people, and low and lower-middle-income countries. While apocalyptic framings of our environmental future are rampant, many marginalized communities describe how they have already experienced the apocalypse under colonial rule and the legacies of racism and settler colonialism. In this class, we engage with feminist, antiracist, queer, and Indigenous literary theories on environmental destruction, environmental justice, and apocalyptic literatures. This interdisciplinary class, "Apocalyptic Feminisms," can be understood multi-directionally as feminisms discussing past and present apocalypses, visions for feminist apocalypses that will eradicate oppression, and toolkits for survival on this planet. ART 311	Seminar in Visual Culture, History, and Theory: Text and Textile	As many of the artists and writers we will examine in this course note, text and textile share their origins in the wordtexere (to weave). The point of departure for the course is the solo exhibition of poet/visual artist Jen Bervin's work (University Galleries, Fall 2020). The course will begin with a chronological overview of textile/fiber art (weaving, embroidery, knitting/crochet, samplers, quilting, etc.) and its relationship to text, and then continue thematically (for example, attending to issues of gender & identity, social justice, poetics, narrative, collage & montage, materiality & form, and the divide between craft/art) and include work by writers/artists from antiquity to the present.
