The purpose of this worksheet is to assist undergraduate students pursuing a minor in WGSS in planning and tracking their coursework. Students must complete four core courses: WGS 120; ENG 160, or 260, or 261, or 360; PHI 246; and HIS 261 or 262. Students must also complete three elective courses from those listed on the reverse side.

#### ANT 270: Anthropology of Gender and Sexuality

An anthropological examination of the concepts of gender and sexuality, as they intersect with the social categories of sex, race, class, and nation.

#### CJS 339: Women in Criminal Justice

Historical and theoretical perspectives and contemporary trends concerning women and crime and processing of women by the criminal justice system. *Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.* 

### CJS 342: Victimology

An examination of the victim's role in the criminal event, the process of victimization, patterns, trends, theories and victim offender relationships. *Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.* 

#### COM/ENG/LAN 128: Gender in the Humanities

Examination of gender roles, norms, and stereotypes from a broad range of perspectives within humanities across centuries and cultures.

#### ENG/LAN 206: Cultural Expressions in Social Contexts: Women of Asia, Latin America, and Africa

Interdisciplinary study of varieties of women's cultural expressions within distinct social contexts including comparative emphasis on different regions of concern.

#### ENG 260: History of Literature by Women

A historical overview of writing by women. *Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.* 

#### ENG 261: Women's Literature in a Global Context

Literature by women of diverse ethnicities to examine varieties of texts and their cultural construction. *Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.* 

### ENG 360: Studies in Women's Writing

Studies in and theories of women's writing. May repeat if content differs; maximum 6 hours. Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.

# HIS/SOC/FCS 112: American Family: Change and Diversity

Historical and comparative exploration of activities of family formation, maintenance, and reconfiguration in America. Emphasis on issues of diversity.

### HIS 261: History of Women in the United States to 1865

*If not chosen to fulfill requirement.* The role of women in the economic, social, political, and cultural history of America from the colonial period to the Civil War. *Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.* 

#### HIS 262: History of Women in the United States since 1865 If not chosen to fulfill requirement. The role of women in the

from 1865 to the present. *Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.* 

#### HIS 330: The Family in History

History of the family in Europe and America, viewing change from idealist, economic determinist, family systems, and psychoanalytic perspectives. *Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.* 

### HIS 350: Women and Sexuality in Ancient Greece and Rome

An exploration of sources, methodologies, and debates concerning women, gender and sexuality in ancient Greece and Rome. *Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.* 

#### IDS 121.39: Texts & Contexts: Women X Women Contemporary Playwrights

Interdisciplinary writing intensive course that examines plays by contemporary women playwrights that explore female-to-female relationships: mothers and daughters, sisters, lovers, strangers, and friends. *Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.* 

#### PHI 202: Sex, Values, and Human Nature

Investigation of competing views about the nature of human sexuality, and their moral and social consequences.

#### POL 225: Women in Politics

The study of the role of women in the political process.

#### POL 337: Gay & Lesbian Politics and Theory

Explores LGBT (lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender) political movements in historical context and with reference to claims for citizenship. *Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.* 

#### POL 338: Gender and Political Theory

Examination of how gender shapes and is shaped by public policy formulation and implementation in different political and state contexts. *Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.* 

### POL 363: Political Theories of Nonviolence

Analysis of contending theories and approaches regarding nonviolence and civil disobedience.

### PSY/SOC 123: Human Sexuality

Basic psychological, sociocultural, and physiological elements of human sexuality.

#### PSY 305: Psychology of Women

Psychological research to place in scientific perspective the etiology and behavioral consequences of female and male oriented attitudes. *Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.* 

## SOC 264: Racial, Social Class and Gender Inequality

Examination of social constructions of race/ethnicity, social class, gender. How categories are transformed into systems of inequality nationally and globally. *Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.* 

### SOC 265: Personal Relationships

Introductory course on theory, research, and methods in the study of a variety of social and personal relationships. *Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.* 

### SOC 311: Selected Studies Issues in Gerontology\*

Advanced treatment of selected subjects in gerontology. Multiple enrollments are allowed if content differs. *Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.* 

#### SOC 341: Sociology of Gender

Explores the concepts, theories, and methods sociologists utilize to explain gendered differences in social relations and life changes. Examines individual, interactional, institutional, and social change processes. *Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.* 

#### SOC 342: Sociology of the Body

Explores the concepts, theories, and methods sociologists utilize to study the body in social life. Special emphasis on non-normative bodies. *Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.* 

#### SOC 366: Contemporary Social Movements

Theories, methods, and research on social movements in the United States and on transnational social movements, including the women's movements. *Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.* 

#### WGS 292: Introduction to LGBTQ Studies

Interdisciplinary introduction to lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and Queer Studies. Topics will include LGBTQ histories, social movements, politics, and cultures.

# WGS 390: Interdisciplinary Research in Women's and Gender Studies $% \mathcal{T}_{\mathrm{S}}$

Students will research and write on an interdisciplinary topic of their choice relevant to women's and gender studies. *Arrange with WGS advisor or director*.

#### WGS 391: Women's and Gender Studies Seminar

A critical examination of selected topics in women's and gender studies. *May be repeated if topics are different: maximum of 6 hours.* 

#### WGS 392: Queer and Transgender Theory

Research in the interdisciplinary field of LGBT/Queer Studies, emphasizing how queer theory informs a variety of academic disciplines and discourses. *Prerequisites: WGS 120 or permission of instructor.* 

# WGS 398: Professional Practice: Internship in Women's and Gender Studies

Supervised work experience in local, state, national, or international businesses, agencies, institutions, or organizations focusing on gender issues and their intersections with race, class, sexuality, and ability. *May be repeated. Arrange with WGSS advisor or director. Prerequisites: See ISU catalog.* 

\*Course counts for credit toward minor only when taught by WGSS faculty.

**Note:** Your plan of study must be arranged with the WGSS Program advisor. With the approval of the director and WGSS advisor, courses with over 50% gender content can be counted toward the minor.
